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Flight Attendant Union Praises Senate for Reaching Deal on FAA, Braces for More Difficult Fight in September

FORT WORTH (Aug. 5, 2011) - The Association of Professional Flight Attendants praised the work of President Obama, Secretary of Transportation Ray LaHood, FAA Administrator Randy Babbitt and key Senators including Reid, Baucus, and Hutchison for their work in reaching a short-term deal to reauthorize the FAA yesterday. The agreement, announced by Leader Reid yesterday afternoon, will put back to work thousands of furloughed FAA employees and tens of thousands of construction workers, if only until mid-September.

"I am encouraged by the Senate's ability to put politics aside for the sake of getting people back to work," said APFA President Laura Glading. "Unfortunately, this short term deal will only get us so far. It kicks a very delicate can just six weeks down the road and our union is gearing up for another tough legislative battle for workers' rights after Labor Day. I would like very much to see a long-term bill come out of this drama, but certainly not at the expense of organized labor. I call on Chairman Mica to take a more thoughtful stance on the NMB provision as he works to pass a permanent FAA reauthorization or long-term extension."

The House passed a permanent reauthorization in April, but it included language that weakened the aviation industry's labor unions and the National Mediation Board, which was a non-starter with Senate Democrats. That disagreement is, in part, what led to the recent impasse and partial agency shutdown.
